


On May 14, 1957, construction was started on the new Blissfield Community High School Building.

Warren Holmes Company of Lansing, Michigan was the architectural firm which had drawn the plans and was to supervise the construction. The general contractor was Fred W. Entenman, Inc. of Toledo, Ohio.



Blissfield High School offered six mathematics courses ranging from general mathematics to solid geometry.

One year of mathematics was required for graduation. Those students who wanted a practical course in advanced arithmetic took general math. Those who wished to take more math in high school chose algebra their first year. Plane geometry was offered to sophomores. Those students who planned to go into engineering or scientific fields were able to take a year of advanced algebra, a semester of solid geometry and one of trigonometry.

Science







Homemaking

The homemaking department was much larger this year to accommodate the number of students taking the courses. New facilities were also provided including a washer and dryer, ironer, cut out tables, sewing machines and completely new kitchen units.

Miss Shinabarger, one of the new teachers, taught three courses to students from all grades. In the first course the girls were introduced to good grooming, the preparation of foods, and sewing. Grooming was emphasized to a greater degree in the second course together with menu planning and sewing. The third course offered more advanced instruction in all phases of homemaking.

Besides the subjects mentioned the girls also studied consumer buying, baby sitting, and furnishing a home among other topics.

Music

The music department was expanded greatly both in space and facilities. The new band room was especially equipped for band rehearsals and practice rooms were provided for individual and ensemble practice.

The Band Boosters, made up of parents of the band members, sponsored many projects throughout the year, using the money for new instruments and new uniforms. They also provided four scholarships to Interlochen, the National Music Camp.

The two choruses, open to all students interested in singing, gave pleasure to those who simply enjoyed singing and training to those who intended to continue with vocal music.

The library, adjacent to the study hall, included an office and workroom, and a small conference room for special study. It was available to all students for reference work, study, and reading for enjoyment.

Vocational Agriculture

Four courses are offered in agriculture. Farm Crops, the freshman Ag. subject, teaches all phases of growing farm crops. The sophomore subject, Animal Husbandry, teaches the care and management of animals. In Soils, the Ag. boys learn the care, judging, and management of the soil. Farm Management, teaches the general management of a farming program.

Boys who complete the four agricultural courses are well trained in agriculture and have a good background for farming as a vocation.

In Drivers' Education, a one semester course, students learn how to be better and safer operators of automobiles. It is taken as close to students' sixteenth birthdays, the age at which a driver's license can be obtained, as possible.

Thirty hours of classroom instruction and six hours of actual supervised driving practice are required to obtain a driver certificate.

General Shop Farm Shop

A general shop and a farm shop were provided in the new building giving ample space for all kinds of shop instruction. Three General Shop courses are given. In Shop I the fundamentals of shop work are taught and small projects are made in which skills with hand tools are gained.

In Shop II and III more advanced skills are taught and larger projects are made using both wood and metal. Power tools are used extensively in both of these courses. Shop III was offered for the first time this year.



Plans were also made to further develop the shop program next year.





Sophomores Serve At Banquet


Actively participating in school affairs throughout the year the sophomores sponsored two all-school dances.





In the last game of the year the Blissfield Royals went on a scoring rampage against Summerfield, scoring 42 points while holding their opponents scoreless.






